IEP-required group counseling is expected to supplement the regular guidance and counseling program.</p> <p>Guidance services include interpersonal, intrapersonal or family interventions, performed in an individual or group setting by a qualified individual pursuant to an IEP. Specific programs include social skills development, self-esteem building, parent training, and assistance to special education students supervised by staff credentialed to serve special education students. These services may include consulting with other staff in planning school programs to meet the special needs of children as indicated in the IEP. Typically, services are provided in education settings by an itinerant teacher or the itinerant teacher/specialist. Consultation is provided to the teacher, staff and parents as needed.
